Towards a Framework of Service

As things around us change, so does the way we do service. Our reasons for doing so do not change, as they are firmly grounded in the core tenets of loving God and neighbor, but the way we do it adjusts to our neighborhood and world. With that in mind, I simply want to lay out here a very basic twofold framework of how we are currently doing service in the midst of change.

One way, broadly, is in supporting places that meet essential needs. Last fall our Sunday morning Breakfast and the Interfaith Winter Shelter both physically moved out of our building into local organizations—Shalom Community Center and Wheeler Mission, respectively. While this was a big change operationally, it wasn't really in terms of intention, as our volunteers and resources continued to go to these programs to meet the same basic needs. Something similar could be said by the way our church and/or its members support any number of good places, from Habitat for Humanity to MCUM to The Salvation Army to Thriving Connections to CASA to dozens of other critical organizations in Bloomington and the world. We will continue to support those places in service as long as those needs are still there.

But another way of doing service is sometimes called mutual ministry. Indeed, that was the title of an insightful article by Nancy DeMott and Katie Lindberg from the wonderful Center for Congregations in Indianapolis. (Helen recently sent this short article along, and I'd recommend anyone who even remotely cares about how the church does service check it out.) As the authors explain, mutual ministry is about "a commitment to work with, not for, the people they wish to serve." They characterize it as relational, asset-based, and collaborative. And hopefully this concept of service sounds familiar—even in events in just the next week. It's at the heart of the XPLOR program (whose Mission Specialist Ben Bohren is visiting Thursday as we look towards becoming a host church next year) where young adults exploring a call to service join with the church and community and community organizations in an effort to enrich all three. It's the idea behind something we're trying on Saturday called Art Together, which brings church members and former Breakfast guests together in a shared space to create art. It's the purpose for our follow up trip to Cuba, which holds initial meetings on Sunday and Tuesday: not a trip where we go do things for our Cuban hosts, but with them. We've already been moving toward incorporating this kind of service, this mutual ministry, and will continue to do so, just as we will continue to support good organizations in good work. It's not an either/or, nor even a both/and. Rather, it just is—because even in the midst of change, love just is.


