Advent Worship: Something Unique & Special Each Sunday

Even though our Advent Worship will be grounded by the traditional themes of hope, peace, joy, and love, each week holds something very special and unique:

Advent 1 (December 2): We join all those who, throughout the ages, have yearned for a Savior who will come to redeem this broken world. Anthems, hymns, ancient prophetic voices, and the verses of the hymn "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" will provide shape and substance to this very special service of Advent Lessons and Carols.

Advent 2 (December 9): Mark Knowles will offer his reflections on Hebrews 11:1-2, 32-40. This will be our last opportunity to hear Mark preach before he and Danielle begin their three



year assignment as Global Mission Co-workers in Lesotho (Africa).

Advent 3 (December 16): On this day, as we commission Mark and Danielle to witness to Christ's love through their work with Global Ministries. Pastor Helen will reflect on the shepherds' commission to go to Bethlehem to witness God's love revealed in the Christ child. (Luke 2:15-18). This service will include a special time of prayer for Mark, Danielle, FCC, and the ministries of the wider church. Marco Cable, Area Executive for the Africa Desk of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ, will be our special guest. Following worship, there will be a pitch-in meal that will give us an opportunity to send off Mark and Danielle in a fun and festive way.

Advent 4 (December 23): On the 200th Anniversary of the writing of the beloved carol *Silent Night*, Pastor Helen will reflect on some of the key phrases from this most cherished carol. Her hope is that as we sing *Silent Night* on Christmas Eve, our joy will run deeper still as we anticipate the coming of "heavenly peace."

Pastor's Pen Helen's "How To" Guide to the Season(s)

Believe it or not, the Christmas Season* is **NOT** upon us, but two other seasons are: The Advent Season and the Holiday Season. Advent, marked by Christians around the world as the beginning of the church year, gives us opportunity to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ. It calls for quiet contemplation, hope-filled waiting and praying, and intentional watching for signs of Divine Light that, even now, pierces the darkness of this fragile world.

In contrast, the Holiday Season (aka "The Holidays") calls for an increase in activity that discourages us from carving out times for quiet waiting and watching. Indeed, as we immerse ourselves in the festivities (and the busy-ness!) of the season, I frequently hear the mantra "so much to do, so little time."

As Christians, we can find it challenging to simultaneously navigate the clashing cultures and competing expectations of both Advent and "The Holidays." So, back by popular demand, I'm offering my (revised) guide designed to help you celebrate both seasons. It has helped me, and I hope it does the same for you!

- When you find yourself waiting in a line or in traffic, practice peace: breathe deeply and offer a quiet prayer for those in front of you and behind you.
- When you feel yourself becoming impatient or angry with someone, practice gratitude as you
 refocus your thoughts and attention on what brings you joy.
- Carve out just 3 minutes in the middle of your day (and set a reminder alarm) to pray for peace: peace in this world, peace for somebody you know, peace within your own heart.
- Get real: admit that life is not all "jingle bells." Then, instead of wishing that your life looks like a Norman Rockwell illustration, name its brokenness as you the refrain of Leonard Cohen's anthem.

 Anthem:

Ring the bells that still can ring; Forget your perfect offering. There is a crack in everything; That's how the light gets in.

- Get up early enough to watch the sunrise. As you acknowledge the reality of the world's darkness, watch the landscape change as the light begins to dispels the shadows. And hope!
- Pray for the hungry, and the homeless, and the refugee. Then feed and clothe and provide for them. That's how prayer works.
- Pay attention to the profound and hope-filled words of the Advent Carols that we will sing in
 worship. Because they are not "holly jolly" fluff, they will ground you in the deep, deep joy that
 comes as we wait expectantly for the coming of Christ.
- Rejoice, for Christ WILL come!

ADVENT LESSONS AND CAROLS BASED ON THE GREAT "O ANTIPHONS"

Sunday Morning — December 2

As we know, Advent is a season of expectation: the word itself means 'coming'. It recalls ancient Israel's hope for the advent of the Messiah, God's Anointed One, a new King David. It also expresses the Christian hope for the fulfillment of God's Kingdom and the expectation of God's presence in human history. It celebrates Christ's coming to lead the world from darkness to light. This year, on the first Sunday of Advent – December 2 – we will again worship with an Advent Lessons and Carols Service. The seven lessons and seven carols at this service are chosen and organized around the so-called "Great O Antiphons," a series of chants that were sung along with the *Magnificat* at Vespers on the seven nights before Christmas Eve. Each antiphon is a prayer for deliverance, and they all begin by addressing the Messiah by one of the prophetic titles found in the Old Testament:

O Sapientia (Wisdom)

O Wisdom, you came from the lips of God the most high, Pervading and permeating all creation, powerfully and gently ordering all things: Come and teach us the way of prudence.

O Adonai (Sacred Lord)

O Adonai and Ruler of the house of Israel, Who appeared to Moses in the flame of the burning bush and gave him the Law on Sinai: Come with your outstretched arm to redeem us.

O Radix Jesse (Root of Jesse)

O Root of Jesse, who stands for as a sign to the peoples, Before whom kings are silent and to whom the nations pray with longing: Come quickly to deliver us.

O Clavis David (Key of David)

O Key of David, ruler of the house of Israel, You open and no one can shut; You shut and no one can open: Come and rescue the prisoners who are in darkness and in the shadow of death.

O Oriens (Dayspring)

O Dayspring, Splendor of Light everlasting: You are the dawning sun, the Sun of justice. Come and enlighten those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.

O Rex Genitum (King of the nations)

O King of the nations and fulfillment of their longing You are the Cornerstone uniting all people; you formed us from primeval clay.. Come and save us all.

O Emmanuel (God with us)

O Emmanuel, our King and giver of the law, the people await you, their Savior: Come and save us, O Lord our God.

These so-called "O antiphons" — seasonal sentences sung before and after scripture - embed a striking acrostic: read in inverse order from last to first, the second letter of each antiphon spells out the words ERO CRAS, which in Latin means "tomorrow I will be with you." The verses of the familiar carol *O Come*, *O Come*, *Emmanuel* are derived from these antiphons and will be sung by the congregation as an introduction to each lesson.



Monroe County United Ministries

Meeting the Needs of Our Neighbors for Nearly 80 Years

It's that time of year when we're full of good cheer and many of us are expectantly looking forward to Christmas; but, what if we were unable to put food on the table? For nearly 80 years, we at FCC have helped support Monroe County United Ministries (MCUM) with donations of money from the church, our congregants, and held food drives for their emergency pantry.

MCUM started out as a daycare facility. Later a food pantry and Opportunity House were added. Today MCUM clients on their first visit, meet with a coach to create a game plan to bring financial stability to their home. Resources include a Self-Sufficiency Center, a Food Pantry, Opportunity House for clothing and household items, and Compass Early Learning Center which is open in two locations and provides daycare on a sliding scale. MCUM's 30-year goal, recently implemented by its board, is to end generational poverty for its clients. **How could you not want to be a part of that?**

Over the years, MCUM provided the first pre-school facility, the first emergency shelter for the homeless, and was one of the first social service organizations in the county. Before becoming agencies of their own, Head Start and Community Kitchen had their beginnings at MCUM.

Each year during the Sundays in Advent, we mound together canned goods and cleaning supplies on the chancel. It is fun watching the mound grow as we go through the month of December. Please help us have a banner year by bringing in a gift each Sunday to place on the chancel, (see a wish list below) Monetary gifts are also accepted. You may make out a check to First Christian Church and write MCUM on the memo line. Please be generous as the need in Monroe County continues to escalate.
